Mysteries of the Cotswolds reveal another world

John Lendis is a painter of landscapes for whom the very idea of 'landscape' includes within it human emotions and memories. He grew up in Nottingham, but as a young artist spent years traveling through the deserts of Afghanistan, the Middle East and Asia, before arriving in Tasmania, where he established himself as an important contemporary Australian painter. Today, he lives and works in the Cotswolds and these exciting new paintings seem to indicate that living in the area suits his artistic vision.

Since his arrival in 2010, Lendis has been struggling to come to terms with the remarkable intensity of the seasons in this part of Britain. "These paintings were begun in October 2010," Lendis explains, "during that



incredibly beautiful autumn which arrived so suddenly – with such a shocking violence of colour – and which then departed at an equally alarming speed, completely erased by a covering of thick, white snow."

'When I drive through the same place on different days I am confronted by scenes of striking intensity, created by mist, fog, rain or light; it is nothing short of disorienting.'

'These paintings spring from my daily journeys through the Cotswolds – driving my children to school in Hatherop, driving to my studio in Stowell Park, shopping in Cirencester, driving through Oxfordshire. The paintings have grown out of these hallucinogenic encounters, mysterious moments, where I have been overcome by a sudden jolt of awareness that my pragmatic act of driving along the same roads day after day actually holds within it the sense that I am able to enter into a different world.'

Prior to studying for his Bachelor and Masters degrees in Painting (1996, 2006), Lendis undertook a Diploma in Textile Design in his hometown of Nottingham (1970) and the artist is somewhat surprised at how this early attraction to patternmaking and the Arts and Crafts Movement of the 19th Century is present in this exhibition of work.

Works of complexity and skill

'Making these paintings was incredibly difficult," Lendis explains, "it was such a technically complex process and so mechanical – it reminded me so much of producing a wallpaper pattern or designing fabric. Normally, in my painting, there is the beauty of a singular gesture of paint, a stroke that 'completes' an image and is unrepeatable. In these works, because they are reflections of themselves, that wasn't possible and I felt at times that I was actually making 'anti-paintings'.

'Every stroke had to be replicated up-side-down or back-to-front and trying to build up the layers of glaze in that way proved incredibly complicated. These works are incredibly dense as well and the intensity of colour



and detail, plus working in glazes with the reflected subjects, requires sustained months of brainpower as well as the normal demands of painting.'

An International Career

With more than 26 solo exhibitions in Australia, New Zealand and the United Kingdom, John Lendis continues to exhibit internationally and his work is the subject of numerous critical reviews and essays. He has work in both public and private collections in the UK and Australia.

Lendis's paintings often engage with historical expressions of meta-narratives: stories such as the Crusades, the search for a promised land or the holy grail and with the margins of great historical adventures such as the building and subsequent dissolving of 'Empire'. The artist personalises these narratives and they find connection with his own life, infusing his paintings with references to earlier artists and/or writers, who have dealt with similar themes.
