Norman and Anna Adams travelled to Scotland on their first painting trip in 1951: they became increasingly drawn to the wilderness of the North and the incredible quality of the light and atmosphere. In 1969 they bought "No. 10 Scarp", on the tiny Hebridean island off the coast of Harris. Over the next ten years Norman, Anna and their two children spent each summer based at the remote crofter's cottage, where he produced hundreds of small paintings, stimulated by the very essence of all that surrounded him. These delicate and beautifully made watercolours frequently formed the basis of some of his most successful large scale paintings produced back in his studio in North Yorkshire.

Norman Adams was Keeper of the Royal Academy 1986-95; Professor of Painting, Royal Academy Schools 1995-2000; and lecturer at several of the country's leading art schools and universities. His work is held in numerous national public collections.
